Over the last 15 years the Arnold Foundation has changed the landscape and the language associated with our School. We can genuinely say that ‘Rugby is a broad church’: a rich and eclectic mix of able young boys and girls, from very different backgrounds, united in the common pursuit of excellence.

Our anniversary celebrations have offered an opportunity to reflect on all that has been achieved since 2003. With 129 students having benefitted directly and more than £21 million raised, the Foundation is a fabulous testament to the generosity of the Rugbeian community, the commitment of dedicated staff and the engagement of those families and partner organisations that have supported the students during their time at Rugby. Those who benefitted in the early years have now embarked upon substantial careers. You will see in this Review a collection of reflections on the lasting and positive influence Rugby has had on their lives.

My enormous thanks are due to my predecessor and our Founding Trustee, Patrick Derham, whose vision and energy created this ground breaking programme and to the Chairmen of the Arnold Foundation Board, the late Sir Ewen Fergusson (SH 45-51), Michael Fowle (St 53-58), Peter Bennett-Jones and Barry O’Brien for their huge commitment.

Today, over 35% of Rugby School students are receiving financial assistance in the form of bursaries or scholarships and our flagship 100% boarding bursary

programme, the Arnold Foundation, with 32 students funded, remains at the heart of the School.

There has been much to celebrate this year. The summer saw our best ever GCSE results, while A Level results were better than our major competitors for the second year running. Arnold Foundation candidates were very much part of that exam success, performing in line with the rest of the School with two Arnold Foundation students achieving nine A* grades at GCSE and others scoring top marks across a range of subjects.

The Arnold Foundation is well represented on the sports field, in music and the wealth of other co-curricular activities at the School. Students tell us that Rugby offers a balance and provides enrichment in both academic and personal life not available in their previous schools. Two students are proud members of the XV while others are competing in sports teams at all levels. Another two students are music scholars; they have been representing the School in numerous choral concerts alongside their orchestral commitments. Our tradition of service continues in the form of Community Action and Arnold Foundation students report how much they enjoy the mentoring of local primary school children.

The Arnold Foundation remains a revolutionary programme unique to Rugby making an enormous contribution to so many at the School. As we strive to develop the programme, we continue to rely on the

generous involvement of all Rugbeians, parents and friends who fund the students today, and a successful legacy programme that will build the endowment for the future; we hope you will find a way to get involved.

We are hugely proud of all we have achieved together to benefit these young boys and girls. The Arnold Foundation is made possible by the continuing efforts and generous commitment of everyone involved and for which I am both humbled and so, so very grateful.

GREG SAMMONS (SF 04-06): *Greg was one of the first three Arnold Foundation students at Rugby. He played professional Rugby for a number of years before injury brought an end to his playing career. With his usual resilience, Greg chose to study Sport Science at Loughborough University completing his BSc in 2015. He now works as a strength and conditioning coach for the Cornish Pirates while making time for his PhD in Sports Medicine. Greg married Holly in June 2016.*

"When we first visited Rugby we could not believe the architecture of the buildings and the facilities on offer - but I was more interested in seeing the famous Close and all I wanted to do at the time was train and play on it! Once I was lucky enough to get offered the first Arnold Foundation place there wasn't really a decision to be made on my behalf and I accepted straight away and started planning the move to boarding school, which I was excited for!

"I have so many memories of my time at Rugby School from captaining the first XV to amazing lessons in photography and media studies and their fantastic facilities. However, the most memorable thing about Rugby was all the different people I met along my journey that made my experience what it was, and I know if and when I see friends or staff from my school days, we catch up like no time has passed at all. Rugby is a very special school and I valued how I was always treated as an individual.

"The School only ever had a positive impact on me and I was lucky enough to leave and play professional rugby for many years. However, due to injury I had to retire at a young age leaving me pondering what I would do with my life. I used my A levels to go to Loughborough University and study a BSc in Sports Science and started as a strength and conditioning coach within professional rugby, and am currently continuing my studies for a PhD in Sports Medicine at the University of Central Lancashire. I feel none of this would have been possible without Rugby School, and the interests I have are still influenced from my time there.

"The Arnold Foundation is simply fantastic and I can't thank the donors enough for giving me the opportunity to become the best version of myself. I will always be grateful to them, the staff and my fellow Rugbeians for all of the academic and life lessons I experienced. I cherish every single memory I made and everyone I met. Today, I still work in professional sport, however, I know if the time came I will always have my education and life experiences from school to help me along another journey and I feel blessed and grateful for the opportunity. MICHAEL MATHER (C 06-08): *Michael came to Rugby in 2006 from a small mining village in Northumberland. Originally studying Natural Sciences in Durham he converted to Medicine in 2009 and undertook a Neurology Elective at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in 2013. Michael is now an Academic Clinical Fellow at Newcastle University, specialising in Otolaryngology, and in 2017, he returned to Rugby to present the annual Arnold Foundation Lecture in the School's 450th Anniversary year. He is married to Sissi who recently gave birth to their son.*

"For all the grandeur of the ivy-clad buildings and the towering gothic architecture, which might initially seem intimidating, I distinctly got the impression it was a very welcoming community.

"I enjoyed the fact that Chapel was quite a large part of life at Rugby and without it ever being 'pushy' I found that it instilled a sense of needing to reflect on one's actions and to make time for quiet contemplation. Although I did not realise it at the time, I think this sense of self-awareness and need for reflective thinking really gave me the tools to continue developing as a person long after leaving the School. I'm not sure that this is something that is taught or even passively absorbed in schools other than Rugby.

"Before Rugby I did not know anyone in medicine and had little realistic idea of what the career was like. I feel that Rugby opened doors in this regard.

"I have become almost evangelical about how boarding schools actually offer an 'escape' for students who may want to get out of chaotic lives at home and try to make the most of themselves in a constructive, welcoming environment. For me it was transformational.

BARTEK ZAKRZEWSKI (W 07-09): *Having been recommended to Rugby by our long standing partner organisation, IntoUniversity, Bartek was quick to make the most of all the School had to offer. A degree in Law followed before he made the move into finance, initially joining Barclays Corporate Bank. Now a Partner at Monteith Partners, Bartek is quick to give back, often speaking at events and mentoring other Arnold Foundation students.*

"Having come from a reasonably modest socio-economic background, only attending day comprehensive schools, I expected Rugby to be very imposing and a challenging place to fit in. I'm thrilled to say I could not have been more wrong! While the School's reputation precedes it, I found it to be distinctly unpretentious and incredibly welcoming.

"What I loved most about Rugby is that [my timetable] wasn't focused on any one area of School life but rather had a very strong framework in all aspects including sport, arts and academics. The choice is vast and I think one would struggle to be bored or uninterested for even so much as an hour at the School.

"Whilst Rugby covers knowledge and exam technique, the staff taught us how to think. It's an underrated and invaluable skill which allowed me to make better-informed decisions about my career and education – something I think had an enormous amount of impact on where I am today. I now absolutely love my job, the company and the people I work with and I certainly see myself there for the long haul.

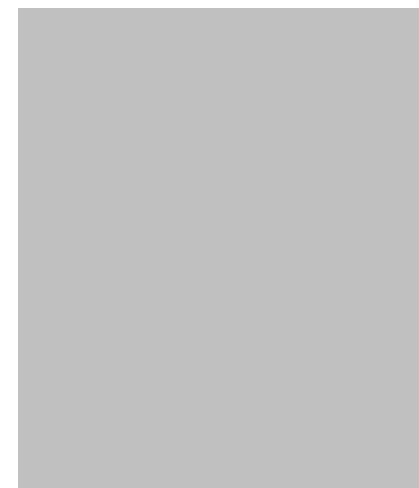

"One thing I learnt from Rugby was that academics were important, but so was developing yourself as a well-rounded individual with so much more to offer the world than just good grades. I knew I'd always wanted to do medicine, but I was also keen to get out into the real world, learn more about myself, mature, work and appreciate life and all it had to offer. So I did just that. I spent a couple of years working, travelling, experiencing the world and gaining a new appreciation for how far I'd come.

"Throughout my time at university I have strived to continue to work hard and diligently. This has perhaps been reflected in my achievements, some of which include the 'ncl+ Award' for my extracurricular endeavours and the 'ncl+ Advanced Award (Research)' for my 10-week summer project into a novel substance's enzymatic activity in the model gut. This work has implication for anti-obesity research, and there is the exciting possibility that the data I collected may be used in a publication, in which case I will be fortunate to be published before leaving university.

"My time at Rugby has prepared me extremely well for my experience of higher education, and as I look back I remember the School fondly.

SHELBY MATTHEWS-READ (G 14-16): *Shelby joined Rugby in the LXX having been made aware of the Arnold Foundation through The Clarion Voice in Leicester. Showing a real flare for photography and proving herself a talented sports woman, Shelby is now studying Psychology at Sheffield University.*

"It is really hard to pick one memorable time at Rugby because they're all so intertwined with each other and one memory brings up so many other good ones! But if I was to pick one of my favourites, it would be my art trip to New York and all other gallery trips such as the V&A in London, because I never knew how much I'd love galleries and taking inspiration from art if I hadn't picked it for my A Levels. I still go to galleries now because I'm always amazed and entertained by the appreciation of other people's art.

"So many people who see me say how much I've changed and I know, just from how it feels inside, and it's really hard to explain. But to put it in words, I am way more confident and independent than I was before Rugby.

"I used to be so socially anxious because I never really went outside my comfort zone, I hated and struggled with simple things like ordering in restaurants, to important things like meetings, functions or events. I hated having to talk to people because my words used to get so muddled as I would worry so much about saying the wrong thing or looking weird. But Rugby had many functions that I had to attend so I've learnt how to articulate myself and not be so scared of them anymore.

SAQLAIN CHOUDHARY (M 12-17): *Saqlain is already an active Ambassador for the Arnold Foundation, speaking recently at our 15th Anniversary Celebration at the Royal Society and often returning to the School to celebrate achievements or offer advice. He is currently studying Physics at Imperial College, London and credits the School with giving him the confidence to follow his passion.*

"It seems strange to think of my most memorable achievements whilst at school, as although I succeeded academically, it is my sporting achievements that mean the most to me. The new challenges of the sports field excited me and like all things in my life I wanted to become outstanding in them. I began in the U14B team, but I refused to accept mediocrity and through help from my cricket coaches, and my cricket-mad Housemaster, I ended my time at School by playing in the annual Rugby vs Marlborough fixture at Lords in honour of Rugby's 450th anniversary.

"Boarding life gave me a strong sense of my own values and character. It granted me the ability to communicate with people from all facets of life. It allowed me the opportunity to become the best possible version of myself.

"I began to see education as a pursuit of curiosity and not a merely a tool to progress in life.

"To the donors, and by extension the School itself, I would like to thank you for your continued support of young boys and girls like myself. It is truly an impossible task to quantify how momentous an experience Rugby School is for us and how formative it is for our characters. The impact of your efforts goes deeper than grades, medals and awards. It is permanently engraved into our character and life can be forever considered pre-Rugby and post Rugby. To provide someone with the option to be an active participant in the direction of their own lives is truly a priceless gift.



CHAUNCEY DE LOS SANTOS (SH 13-18): *Chauncey arrived at Rugby in 2013 having attended Eastside Young Leaders' Academy, one of our partner organisations. He quickly became a vibrant member of his House and embracing a range of challenges, and, in his final year, playing for the XV. Chauncey is now studying Combined Honours Spanish and Business at Newcastle University.*

"Rugby exposed me to experiences I wouldn't have had otherwise. Meeting people from other socio-economic backgrounds and befriending them too proved that your background doesn't define your character or ability to socialise with others. I now feel more confident for possible future situations, which beforehand I might have found uncomfortable in, such as giving tours and talking to guests. It also consolidated in my mind what kind of person I am and encouraged me to tap into my identity and background (i.e. being a young black male from inner city London) and to take pride from it. I feel this was because I was constantly in an environment where I had less in common than most other people.

The Arnold Foundation was established in 2003 to deliver a programme of boarding bursaries to young people from disadvantaged backgrounds in the UK and to enrich the life and culture of Rugby School. Means tested opportunities are offered to talented students with a need for boarding; they sit alongside the funded day places that have always been available for students who live within 10 miles of the School.

At the heart of the Arnold Foundation’s innovation and success lie strong relationships with partners working with disadvantaged children, a system of coherent and cohesive pastoral care involving staff, partner organisations and parents, the active commitment of the whole Rugby School community of governors, staff, students and parents, and fundraising by Rugby School exclusively for these bursary awards.

The recruitment process is rigorous but offers students and families a chance to engage with the School before testing and interviews. Candidates must have the potential to excel academically but we will also consider those with the potential to flourish in sport, music, art or drama provided they are able to thrive academically. We recruit candidates for year 9 and sixth form entry and all must demonstrate that they will embrace and benefit from boarding.

Awards are offered at 100 per cent bursaries in most cases and can include all essential extras subject to means-testing. Arnold Foundation students will be expected to embrace the two-way nature of their award and make a positive contribution to the Rugby School community. The Arnold Foundation, and the students it supports, are very much an integral part of Rugby’s culture and ethos.

Rugby School Facts and Figures

Rugby is one of the UK’s leading co-educational boarding schools, founded in 1567, which maintains the tradition of innovation in all areas. It is an all round School which values academic excellence, service to the community and which seeks to broaden access and promote tolerance and understanding.


In 2018/19 Rugby has 800 students between the ages of 11-18, of whom approximately 80% are boarding. There are 15 senior houses: 8 for boys and 7 for girls including 2 day houses. The current boy:girl ratio is 54:46.

With 120 teaching staff, Rugby’s current student:teacher ratio is 8:1.

At September 2018, Rugby’s fees are £11,920/term; £35,760 p.a. for boarders and £7,479/term; £22,437 p.a. for day students.


In 2017/18 almost 312 students (38.7% of the total) received a scholarship or bursary at an estimated cost of £3.4 million.
