Arnold Foundation Lecture and Lunch

We were delighted that the Arnold Foundation Lecture, held in September, was given, for the first time, by a former Arnold Foundation student. Dr Michael Mather (C 06-08) joined Rugby in the LXX, from a small mining village in Northumberland. After Rugby, Michael trained at Durham and Newcastle universities, undertaking an elective at John Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore USA. At qualification after his return to England he secured a coveted position as an Academic Foundation Doctor in the North of England.

Now, as an active clinical-academic and aspiring otologist, Michael is combining clinical training with a portfolio of biomedical research activities, where his main focus is mucosal immunology and middle ear disease. Michael is hoping to establish his own research group and continue his work generating novel treatments for complex or recurrent otitis media as we enter the post-antibiotic world.

Michael delivered a fascinating lecture that carefully balanced his own experience on becoming a junior doctor with his current research. The Macready Theatre was packed as he credited Rugby with giving him the "initial aspiration to change to the medical course", having originally embarked on a Natural Sciences degree, while also helping him "develop as a person". His thoughtful reflections were powerful and well received, while the many aspiring medics gathered welcomed the opportunity to learn from his own experience.

Those Rugbeians and friends who attended were able to continue their discussions as they joined Michael and other Ambassadors for the annual Arnold Foundation Lunch. Held to thank all donors to the Arnold Foundation and those who have pledged to remember Rugby School in their Wills, guests heard from current beneficiaries of Arnold Foundation awards and the latest news from former students.

Recruitment

Finding the right students for Arnold Foundation Awards is vital. Candidates undergo a rigorous selection process to ensure they are able to meet Rugby's high academic requirements and demonstrate a genuine need for boarding.

Excellent relationships with our partner organisations, including IntoUniversity, East Side Young Leaders, Royal National Children's SpringBoard Foundation and Hawick High School have been established and nurtured ensuring that candidates are put forward who will truly benefit from a Rugby boarding education and will thrive at the School. New relationships are actively sought, and we reach out to organisations across the country that work with disadvantaged children including sports clubs and community groups. Of course, some students still approach us individually, having found out about the opportunity independently.

Those candidates that pass initial assessment are invited to the School, with their families where possible, to undertake further interviews and testing. For some, an overnight stay at the School might be suggested. This is a competitive process and concludes with a final interview with the Chairman of the Arnold Foundation Board, the Deputy Head (Pastoral) and other senior staff at the School. Means testing confirms eligibility for Arnold Foundation Awards, and this continues to be tracked during a student's time at Rugby. Successful candidates are expected to embrace the two way nature of the award and contribute fully to life at Rugby.

This comprehensive process ensures that those Arnold Foundation students who join the School in September are not only right for Rugby, but Rugby is right for them.

Long term commitment to pastoral support



Pastoral Support

An outstanding commitment to pastoral care is at the heart of the Arnold Foundation and we understand that the decision to attend boarding school can be as daunting for parents as the students themselves.

Additional pastoral care for Arnold Foundation students is provided through their ARNOLD FOUNDATION TUTOR. A team of 11 tutors, all members of teaching staff, are managed by the Senior Tutor, Colette O'Mahoney. They work closely with the pastoral systems in place in each House, providing important additional support for Arnold Foundation students. Usually associated with one boarding House the tutors are able to understand fully the needs and backgrounds of their tutees and can be quick to provide specific support or identify any issues that might arise.

As well as regular meetings with their tutors, Arnold Foundation students are invited to a weekly Arnold Foundation Break and termly supper gathering which provide a valuable opportunity to meet with their peers and members of the Tutor and Development Teams.

The PARENT LIAISON TEAM are led by Caroline Gladstone; a Rugby parent herself for the past 15 years. The team are on hand to ensure that Arnold Foundation parents have all the information they may need, and are able to answer questions some parents may not feel comfortable asking the School. With a wealth of experience, they are easily able to provide advice.

Strategic Direction

While the students and operational aspects of the Arnold Foundation are managed by the School, the strategy is guided by the Arnold Foundation Board which meets termly, setting targets for student numbers, providing support to partner organisations and recommending new partners, having oversight of the pastoral care and raising the funds. We are currently seeking new Board Members who will be advocates of the Arnold Foundation programme across the whole School community. 2017 Facts & Figures management for an and the second seco

Rugby is one of the UK's leading co-educational boarding schools, founded in 1567, which maintains the tradition of innovation in all areas. It is an all round School which values academic excellence, service to the community and which seeks to broaden access and promote tolerance and understanding.

STUDENTS

In 2017/18 Rugby has 809 students between the ages of 11-18, of whom approximately 80% are boarding. There are 15 senior houses: 8 for boys and 7 for girls including 2 day houses and a separate day house for junior (11-13) students. The current boy: girl ratio is 54:46.

TEACHING STAFF

With 118 teaching staff, Rugby's current student: teacher ratio is 8:1.

FEES

At September 2017, Rugby's fees are £11,584/term; £34,752 p.a. for boarders and £7,268/term, £21,804 p.a. for day students (at 13+).

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

In 2016/17 almost 278 students (34.6% of the total) received a scholarship or bursary at an estimated cost of £3.1 million.

FINANCES

- The School's June 2017 consolidated Balance Sheet showed net assets valued at £185.3 million, including School properties (at net book value) of £38 million and investments (at market value) of £150.2 million.
- The annual cost of running the School is approximately £26 million and the objective of meeting this from gross fee income is being

achieved. The major elements of annual costs are teaching (approximately 40% of total), student welfare (17%), premises (27%) and support (16%).

- In 2016/17, the School's consolidated net incoming resources after scholarships, bursaries and prizes of £3.1 million was £2.4 million.
- A full copy of the School's audited accounts may be obtained from the Charity Commission's website (www.charity-commission.gov.uk) or by writing to the Bursar at the School's registered address.

The current cost of supporting one boarding student through the Arnold Foundation for Rugby School is £37,250. This is calculated at 100%uniform, laptop, books and course trips.

"This summer I was fortunate to receive funding to attend the Global Young Leader's Conference in America – a ten day programme that takes place every year in Washington DC and New York. The purpose of the trip was to teach young people aged between 15-18 leadership skills whilst gaining a global perspective from our peers and international officials we met. ... It was a truly international gathering with people coming from all over Africa, the Caribbean, Asia and so many more places. In the space of ten intense but thought provoking days I encountered some of the nicest and most confident young people." Arnold Foundation student in the XX

"I was part of a trip that went to India to carry on the tradition, begun in the year before, of Rugby students aiding Tibetan refugees. Rugby and Tibet's relationship begun in the 1910s when four Tibetan boys came over to study at Rugby. We were involved with many projects helping Tibet Charity India such as teaching English to Tibetan refugees and aiding the nurses on their rounds looking after elderly Tibetans. The experience was truly eye opening and made me much more aware of the privileges I take for granted in England. ... I was exposed to stories about the Chinese occupation of Tibet. One man, to escape Tibet, trekked over the Himalayan mountains for over a month; this determination to follow his own faith has made me much more appreciative of my own. ... The trip to India was a life changing experience that I was privileged to be a part of." Arnold Foundation student in the XX

"I actually felt like teachers believed in me or cared about who I was. In my old school I hardly ever felt challenged in class which led to me talking in class and reduced effort. In normal London schools as a young black boy you could either be smart and not good at sports or good at sports and not deemed intelligent. I was both and teachers hated me for the confidence that it brought me. My head teacher told me that I was a typical black boy that would end up working at Tesco's!" Izaak Williams (C 08-13). Izaak is now working for Brisgg and has just started his own tech company

"Rugby, much like many elite schools, is often seen as a place of privilege. Whilst the school does benefit from excellent resources, attending Rugby can be a truly humbling experience. The school's ethos is strongly geared towards helping the community as well as those less fortunate than you. The Arnold Foundation, which I am proud to have been a beneficiary of, is a perfect example of this. In addition to the bursary programme, Rugby taught me about the importance of giving back in other, non-monetary ways and I learnt that a little kindness goes a long way." Bartek Zakrezewski (W 07-09). Bartek has now started his own Financial Exchange business in London and has pledged donations both from himself and the company.

What Rugby instilled in me, is that you are capable of much more than the baseline. With Rugby you're not just expected to focus on academia, it's much wider than that, where you're encouraged to build in extracurricular activities. This has stayed with me beyond my time at Ruqby, where it's now not enough to just study or to just work, but it's important to throw yourself at opportunities that are around you, and if they're not around you, to seek them out. Arnold Foundation students are expected to embrace the two way nature of their award and many are encouraged to develop their musical, dramatic or sporting talents training with additional lessons or team tours. In fact, Arnold Foundation students are invited to apply for places on the non-essential trips offered to all students; a small fund is set aside each year and some funded trips are awarded following a competitive application process. And although initially, we thought that anonymity would be important for this group of students within Rugby School, it became clear that these young people take an enormous pride in their award and speak comfortably and openly about being an Arnold Foundation student.

"During the past few years I have learnt a lot. I have faced a lot of obstacles such as homesickness, learning to be independent, difficulties in communicating with other people etc, but through endurance and overcoming these difficulties, I have become a better person and I have matured. I have learnt to be brave and to face challenges positively. I learnt to see every challenge as a new opportunity, and I have learnt that it can bring you an entirely new and different experience."

"When you are surrounded by hard working, enthusiastic students, you tend to feel left out if you aren't doing the same and it's that positive social conformity that is the backbone of


