Involvement in the Arnold Foundation has given great pleasure to many. For me, this has been through direct engagement with the pupils and parents who have joined the School as part of the scheme. It is easy to be an advocate of a programme that so profoundly changes the lives of talented young people through a boarding education at Rugby. It was also a pleasure to be involved in the feasibility and launch of the SpringBoard Bursary Foundation in 2013 which draws on the Arnold Foundation experience and expertise to offer boarding bursaries across member schools nationally. We can be rightly proud of the impact our work has on many hundreds of lives.



The Arnold Foundation at Rugby School is in rude health with 35 pupils in School this year and 107 who have benefited to date. In September, we celebrated the arrival of our 100th pupil, a special milestone, with the Evening Standard publishing a profile of Michael Olorunlogbon. The Arnold Foundation remains firmly committed to finding the right pupils with a robust programme of recruitment and rigorous testing. Whilst at Rugby the pupils are given additional tutorial support, they gain confidence and independence through hard work and embrace all that boarding life has to offer. And it is particularly pleasing that our Arnold Foundation pupils perform as well as the whole school. The whole person is the whole point and the Arnold Foundation programme provides an opportunity that continues long after Rugby.

Following Peter Bennett-Jones CBE into the Chair of the Arnold Foundation Board this autumn has left me with big shoes to fill and we are extremely grateful to Peter for his energy, enthusiasm and commitment over the

last six years. A little more than £19 million has now been raised for the Arnold Foundation, with funds used to support pupils or invested in the endowment fund.

Our Parent Ambassadors will host a fabulous celebration dinner on 18 June and raise funds as we celebrate 13 years of the Arnold Foundation. Preparation for the School's 450th Anniversary in 2017 is underway marking Lawrence Sheriff's founding legacy and we are inviting all Rugbeians and friends of the School to include the Foundation in their Will.

The Arnold Foundation will remain, as it is now, a fund for bursaries supporting those who would benefit from a boarding education but without the means to pay the fees. With this in mind we are hugely grateful for the generous gifts to date. We hope, very much, we can continue to rely on the involvement of Rugbeians and friends.

WHY I GIVE: Dr Dick Esslemont (W 55-59)

I enjoyed my time at Rugby. I had a happy teenage with few cares. Perhaps I should have worried more! Looking back now I was disappointed with the teaching and tutoring. Those of us who were not scholarship material should have been shepherded more closely and not left to flounder.

In the close confines of Whitelaw life I made many friends and played sports with gusto. Thanks to a timely tip from a pal in the house, Ronald Cole (W 55-59), to volunteer myself for school team practice when Asian 'flu had cut the numbers regularly training, I got my chance to dazzle TK Vivian. Dazzled or just desperate, he picked me for the next Under 16 match. I never looked back and two years later played in the XV. That was a lesson for life. You make your own luck.

Having enjoyed the hospitality of my housemaster Bill Loughery as a young Rugbeian, I lost touch with the School while I developed my career and raised a family. Some fifteen years ago I started to run reunions for those who won their 'bags' in 1959.

I really got interested when Head Master, Patrick Derham, started the Arnold Foundation in 2003. Here was a scheme to bring in underprivileged children for full fee paid education at a good boarding school. This would improve the culture of the school itself, giving it a more caring outward-looking view of the world. Here was a scheme that I was happy to invest in and I have made a monthly donation of some £30 for eight years. This will continue (gradually increasing in value) until I die and, indeed, afterwards because the Arnold Foundation is in my Will.

When I visit now, I can see the School has changed. No longer all WASPS, there are youngsters of all colours and creeds. As ever, the pupils are delightful with neither a hint of snobbery nor an air of being special.

Thanks to Gift Aid, if just seventy of us give £30 per month for the rest of time, we will be able to pay the full fees for another under-privileged Arnold Foundation scholar, for ever.



2015 FACTS AND FIGURES

Rugby is one of the UK's leading co-educational boarding schools, founded in 1567, which maintains the tradition of innovation in all areas. It is an all round School which values academic excellence, service to the community and which seeks to broaden access and promote tolerance and understanding.

PUPILS

In 2015/16 Rugby has 813 pupils between the ages of 11-18, of whom approximately 80% are boarding. There are 15 senior houses: 8 for boys and 7 for girls including 2 day houses and a separate day house for junior (11-13) pupils. The current boy:girl ratio is 54:46%.

TEACHING STAFF

With 114 teaching staff, Rugby's current pupil:teacher ratio is 8:1.

FEES

As of September 2015, Rugby's fees are £10,995 per term; £32,985 p.a. for boarders and £6,899 per term; £20,697 p.a. for day pupils (at 13+).

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

In 2014/15 almost 270 pupils (33.3% of the total) received a scholarship or bursary at an estimated cost of £2.7 million.

FINANCES

- The School's July 2015 consolidated Balance Sheet showed net assets valued at £114.3 million, including School properties (at net book value) of £33.6 million and investments (at market value) of £78.1 million.
- The annual cost of running the School is approximately £24 million and the objective of meeting this from gross fee income is being achieved. The major elements of annual costs are teaching (approximately 40% of total), pupil welfare (18%), premises (30%) and support (12%).
- In 2014/15, the School's consolidated net incoming resources after scholarships, bursaries and prizes of £2.737 million was £2.772 million.

THE COST OF SUPPORTING A PUPIL AT RUGBY SCHOOL

The current cost of supporting one boarding pupil through the Arnold Foundation for Rugby School is £35,000. This is calculated at 100% of fees with provision for all essential extras including uniform, laptop, books and course trips.

SUPPORTING ARNOLD FOUNDATION PARENTS

The pastoral care offered for Arnold Foundation pupils has set it apart; it is the gold standard for bursary programmes and supports the commitment from our partner organisations which recommend candidates to compete for Arnold Foundation awards. Alongside the support offered to pupils, sits our commitment to their families and this has been offered since 2008 through the Parent Liaison team led by Caroline Gladstone.

Parent Liaison has evolved over the years but broadly-speaking, ensures that the parents have information they need, whether it be about the timing of a Parent's Meeting, what to wear to Speech Day, or how many home clothes their child should bring to School. It also offers reassurance to parents about boarding school life, which is unfamiliar to most, and the first time their children will be away from home. Members of the Parents Liaison team are advisor, listener and counsellor, drawing on their knowledge of the School as a parent of Rugby School pupils themselves.

As the number of pupils, and parents, has increased, the Parent Liaison team has expanded with former Arnold Foundation parents on hand in east and west London and in the Borders of Scotland. Communication with parents begins as soon as awards are made and follows with regular email and phone contact during a pupil's time at the School. Engagement of parents, is a critical success factor for Arnold Foundation pupils. Some families need little additional support but over the years our understanding of what is important has grown and we seek to offer the best experience for Arnold Foundation pupils and their families.

Informal get-togethers are held twice a year in London; organised in conjunction with our partner organisations Eastside Young Leaders' Academy and IntoUniversity, they are often held at partner HQ which is familiar territory for many parents. In June, new Arnold Foundation parents meet current Arnold Foundation parents and so a community is established, offering support and friendship. Meetings ahead of the termly parent/teacher sessions provide another great opportunity to meet for those unable to attend in London.

It is both a rewarding and important role, and one I have embraced and developed over the past eight years. If we are to ensure that the Arnold Foundation pupils integrate well into the Rugby School community, it is essential that parents and families feel comfortable, supported and engaged within the same environment.

“It has been great getting to know the current parents, hearing their stories and experiences and also sharing my own. A lot has changed since I was a parent of a pupil at Rugby, but I feel that all the changes have been for the better. I can see that more support is offered to both the pupils and parents and also how the parents can be more involved in their son or daughter's education at the School.”

AMBASSADOR CASE STUDY Ollie Akinboro (St 10-12)

Joining Stanley in 2010, Ollie came to Rugby after GCSEs at George Green's School, London. She settled in quickly appreciating the community feel of the House and the friendly atmosphere. This helped her to quickly make the most of all the opportunities available and she joined several societies and attended a number of lectures. Rugby challenged Ollie and provided an atmosphere in which she could flourish; in the summer of 2012, she achieved outstanding A Level results including A's in Biology, Chemistry and Maths and B in Physics. She later commented that the School also ensured that she developed interests around other subject areas including politics and philosophy.

Rugby certainly suited Ollie's academic ability, but it also enabled her to develop her extra-curricular interests. She started piano lessons and learnt to ride, even occasionally taking part in polo, and seized the opportunity offered by CCF and Duke of Edinburgh, achieving her Gold Award by the time she left the School.

Ollie is now studying Biomedical Science at Sheffield University after an extended gap year. She has just entered her second year, and is thoroughly enjoying her studies. Passionate about her time at Rugby, Ollie is very keen to give back, and has approached her old school to encourage other youngsters from George Green's School to apply to the Arnold Foundation.

“My time at Rugby was as challenging as it was enjoyable. There were so many opportunities that I would never otherwise have experienced. I was able to advance academically and cultivate skills that benefit me to this day. These propel me to rise above the inevitable challenges I face in university and everyday life. I thoroughly enjoyed my time at Rugby and only wish I had learnt of the opportunity sooner. This is why I am so passionate about helping to ensure that as many students as possible benefit from the Arnold Foundation.”



FINDING THE RIGHT PUPILS

Over the years we have developed our recruitment process to find the right pupils for Arnold Foundation places and as these young people come from a variety of different backgrounds, selection includes a wide range of criteria.

What has not changed, is our requirement that candidates must be academically strong and demonstrably able to cope at Rugby; they must also show that they are particularly suited to what Rugby has to offer as well as being able to fit into a boarding environment. In turn we have to be satisfied there is a genuine need to come to a boarding school.

Pupils can be admitted in Year 9 or Year 12 and recruitment involves a rigorous process of visits, testing and interviews.

“Research shows that home circumstances are a key factor in a young person’s future success. IntoUniversity provides local learning centres and an innovative programme, that supports young people from disadvantaged backgrounds, and where they are inspired to achieve. Many do well at school but their schools can only do so much. Through our long partnership with Rugby School we have been pleased to recommend young people whose aspiration has grown and achievement increased significantly from the boarding opportunity offered by the Arnold Foundation. These students have gained huge personal benefit, some are now established in substantial careers, and IntoUniversity has benefitted too as these young people become mentors through IntoUniversity Centres nationally.”

The academic threshold for entry requires a minimum of 3 A's and 3 B's at GCSE, including English and Mathematics and any subjects to be taken at A level, for those coming to Rugby in the sixth form; candidates will also sit the sixth form entrance examinations and participate in preliminary interviews. For F Block entry, Common Entrance candidates will be expected to pass this test in the normal way, or satisfy the School's academic requirements in the Scholarship examination. Non Common Entrance candidates will take the School's entrance examinations in English and Mathematics.

Apart from a small cohort of candidates in Hong Kong, where all testing, interviewing and funding is organised locally, all Arnold Foundation candidates are from the UK; they make at least one visit to Rugby and attend final panel interviews. The recruitment process is considered both robust and effective and, like all aspects of the Arnold Foundation programme, is kept under constant review.

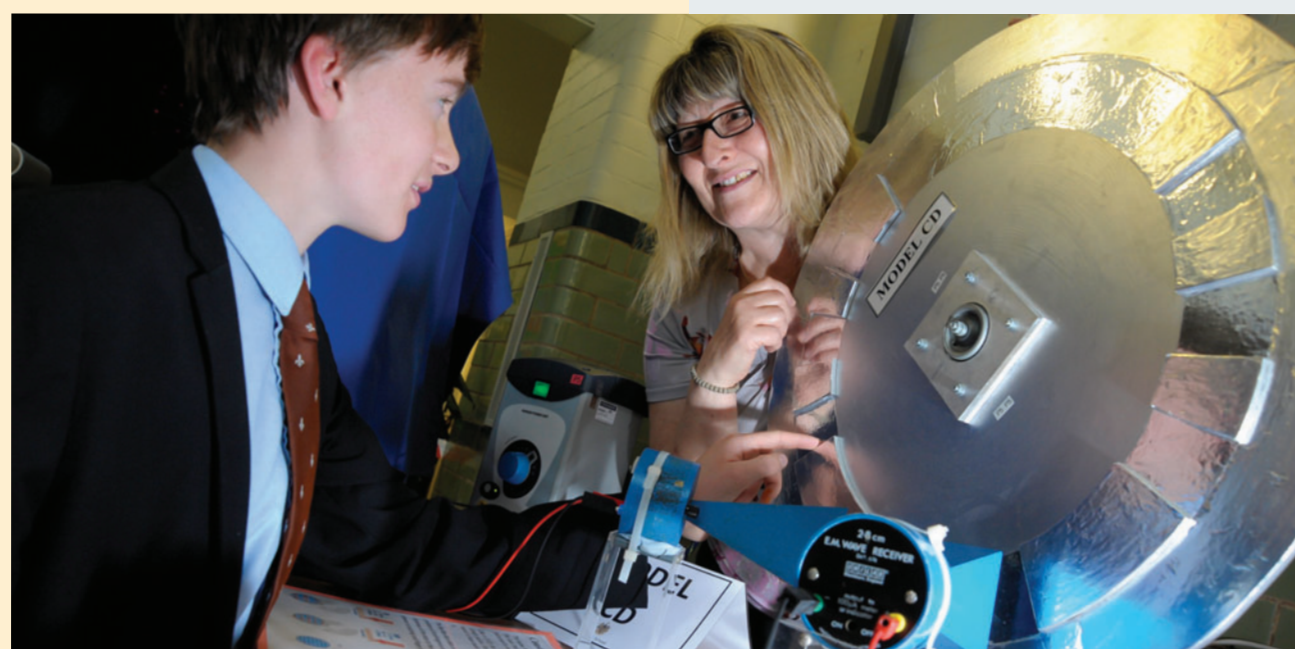
Where candidates come from a partner organisation, initial assessment of financial and academic need has already been done. Those candidates who present independently have often applied to the School in the usual way, having seen information on the website and in our prospectus about augmented scholarship provision. These candidates are assessed on both boarding and financial need and a questionnaire inviting general information about circumstances enables the School to assess the likely need.

Working closely and successfully with partner organisations, mainly educational charities and schools in the maintained sector has enabled us to identify young people from inner cities and some of the UK's most deprived communities. Young people from the UK's poorest backgrounds face a considerable educational disadvantage. They tend to do less well at school than their middle-class peers, they are far less likely to go to university, and they have little chance of ever entering the professions. At Rugby we can redress that with Arnold Foundation pupils performing as well as the whole School. Their detailed knowledge of Rugby and understanding of our boarding programme means our partners are able to identify those candidates who have the most to gain from the Arnold Foundation.

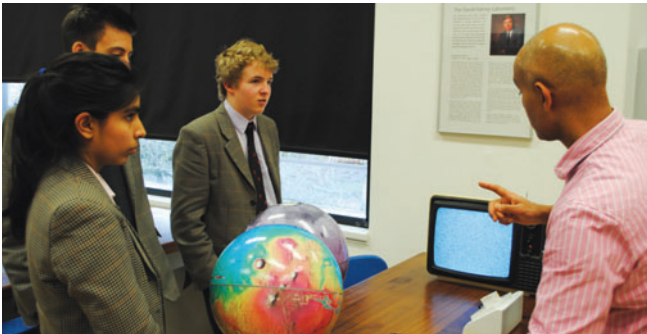

DAVID EJIM-MCCUBBIN (K 09-11)

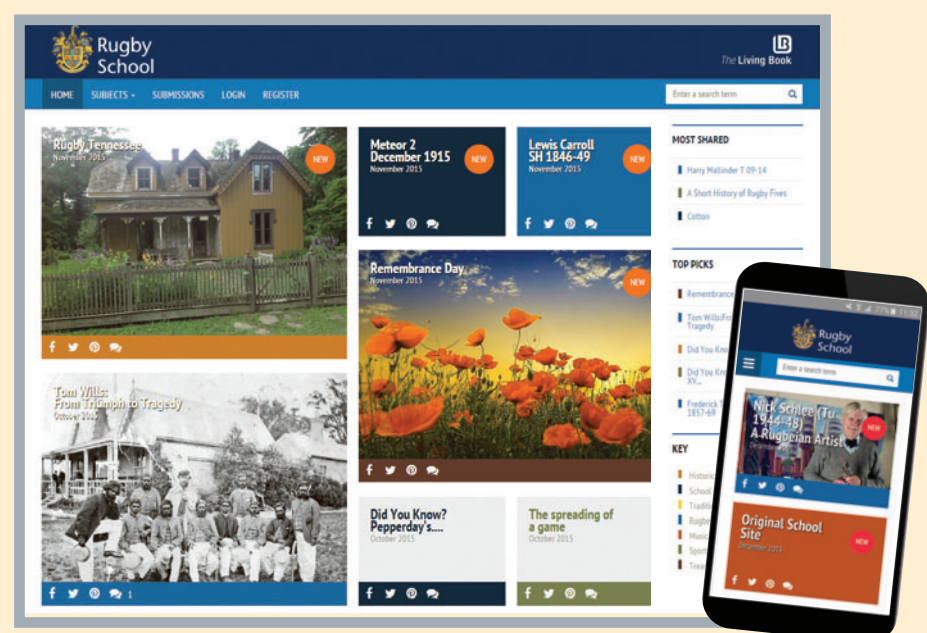
